New Masters Program in Engineering

RIT will offer a new full-time postbaccalaureate internship program leading to the Master of Engineering degree, starting in September, 1972.

The career oriented program will substitute a well-organized industrial internship for the usual M.S. thesis research, according to Dr. Todd A. Bullard, RIT provost and vice president of Academic Affairs, who announced the program.

"Students will be able to complete their degree requirements in a minimum of one calendar year while alternating quarters at RIT as full-time students, and in industry as full-time interns," he stated.

"During the internship period, the student will be employed in a specially

developed engineering position that relates to his career objectives. "In addition to the industrial internship factor, the program will greatly differentiate from most Master of Science programs, in that the student's curriculum will consist of courses highly individualized to meet a specific engineering career goal. Kenyon said that "since our program is built on cooperative, interdisciplinary relationships with real life industry we should be highly effective in providing a responsive, communicative engineering population better equipped to develop, apply and control upcoming technology than the narrow technological specialist who has sometimes been the product of our engineering graduate schools in the past.

"The engineer," he said, "will be increasingly called upon to assist in the solution of such social problems as those relating to the environment problems, that his technological advances have helped create. His curriculum must reflect these changing technologies and social needs, a requirement taken into account in developing our new Masters program."
