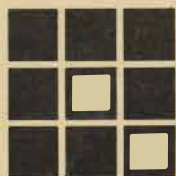

Reston To Describe

'Emergence of China'

New York Times vice president and columnist James B. Reston is expected to provide insight into President Nixon's February trip to Red China when he lectures on "The Emergence of China" Jan. 17 at 8 p.m., in Ingle Auditorium, College-Alumni Union.

The former winner of a Pulitzer Prize for national reporting, will share his observations on America's present role with China and the future relationship of the two world powers in the United Nations.

Reston traveled in China for six weeks last summer while writing a series of articles for The New York Times.

RIT President Paul A. Miller said the Institute is sponsoring Reston's visit in order to broaden the national and international insight of faculty, staff, students and friends of RIT.

"In today's rapidly changing technological society it is imperative that

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It's 'A Matter of Life and Death'

Coping with impending death will be the subject of a seminar entitled "A Matter of Life and Death" on January 22 from 9 a.m. to 3:45 p.m. in the College of Science Auditorium.

The seminar is being jointly sponsored by the Extended Services Division of the College of Continuing Education and the Euthanasia Educational Fund of Rochester. It is geared for concerned persons employed in various phases of the medical profession from doctors to nursing home administrators; and clergy, social agencies and members of the community who may be faced with the problems of death and dying.

Topics to be covered in the seminar will include the enrichment of the professional role in terminal death cases; the right of persons to die in dignity; helping the family accept the closing of life; and other aspects of the theological, medical and legal relationships concerning death.

Moderating the panel for the day-long seminar will be Cliff Carpenter, a columnist with the Rochester Democrat and Chronicle newspaper. Panel members will be Dr. James Bartlett, medical director of the University of Rochester Medical Center; Dr. Shirley Colthart, psychiatrist at the Community Mental Health Center of the University of Rochester; Dr. Oren H.

Baker, dean emeritus of the Colgate-Rochester Divinity School and Peter A. Palangyo, Tanzanian novelist in the black studies program at the State University of New York at Buffalo.

Following the morning panel discussion, group sessions will be held concerning the fear of death, suicides, organ transplants, responsibilities of the family during terminal illness, humanitarianism vs. technical competence and the discussion of death with the dying.

"One of the most pressing social problems of our times is the lack of dignity afforded to those who are faced with death," says Roger K. Powell, assistant director of liberal studies in RIT's Extended Services Division. "We have not yet learned to meaningfully communicate with the dying and members of their families. Our seminar will attempt to educate both professionals and lay people as to what can be done to turn the situation around and bring the subject of death and dying into a more realistic and human perspective."

The cost of the program is \$2 for adults and \$1 for students. Advance registration is necessary and can be made by contacting Mr. Roger K. Powell, Extended Services Division, 464-2213.

all of us become more humane," Dr. Miller stated. "To do this we must keep pace with the current events that impact on all of us. Few journalists could provide a greater insight into China than Reston."

Reston joined The New York Times in its London Bureau in 1939. He remained in London until January, 1941, when he returned to the United States to work at the Washington Bureau, where he specialized in diplomatic and foreign affairs. Early in 1943, he was made an assistant to the publisher Arthur Hays Sulzberger.
