Guldin Named Director of School of Printing

Dr. Mark F. Guldin, coordinator of the RIT graduate program in printing and acting director of the School of Printing since July of last year, has been named director of the School, by Dr. Lothar K. Engelmann, dean of the College of Graphic Arts and Photography.

Dr. Guldin, 35 Barnfield Rd., Pittsford, will be responsible for administering all School of Printing programs for the 500 undergraduate and graduate student body.

"Dr. Guldin is well qualified for this position," Engelmann said. "He has a long personal history with RIT to which he came originally as a student in 1949, and again as a faculty member in 1962. After a leave of absence he obtained a doctoral degree in mass communications from the University of Iowa. During the last two years he has been the coordinator for the graduate program in printing education. Since July, 1971, he has been serving as acting director of the School of Printing."

Management Convocation April 19 WHAM, Telephone Company To Receive Citations

Eli Cantor, chairman of the Board for Printing Industries of Metropolitan New York, and former executive editor for the Research Institute of America, will be guest speaker for the 46th annual RIT Management Convocation Wednesday, April 19 at 6:30 p.m. in the Great Hall of the Rochester Chamber of Commerce.

More than 175 employees from city-area business and industry will be awarded diplomas in the areas of industrial and office supervision, sales, materials handling, packaging, transportation and traffic management and motion and time economy.

Two area communications organizations—Radio Station WHAM and the Rochester Telephone Corporation—will receive special citations for outstanding community service during the Convocation

WHAM's award is "in commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the founding of this, Rochester's pioneer radio broadcasting station; in recognition of its progressive leadership in the communications industry as evidenced by the numerous awards it has won, resulting in gaining a distinguished national reputation in the

field; in appreciation of its long service to the Rochester and Monroe County area, continuing interest in higher education and dedicated support of the community it serves so well."

The award to the Telephone Company is "in commemorating the completion of 50 years of service and growth to its present status as the nation's largest independent operating telephone company; in recognition of its generous support of the objectives of this Institute and its continuous and unqualified endorsement of technological education at the collegiate level; in appreciation of its establishment and endowment of a professorship in communications to foster communications research at RIT and to develop a diversified program in the communicating arts and sciences."

Cantor served for many years on the Board of Directors of PIMNY. He has also served as a director for the Typographers Association of New York, and for Advertising Typographers of America. He has been a management representative on Industry-Union Funds on Automation, and Research and Development, and has served in the same capacity on the Industry-Union "Print New York" campaign.

Cantor has represented the U.S. typographic industry before Congress in hearings on copyright law revision. He serves as chairman of the Research and Technical Committee of the Typographical Council of the Graphic Arts Technical Foundation.

A well-known lecturer on graphics and management, he has fulfilled many engagements at RIT, California State Polytech, Pratt Institute, Cooper Union, New York City Community College, Yale and Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He was a featured speaker in the RIT Management Seminar Series in 1970, and has taken part in graphic arts seminars at RIT.

An attendance of about 700; including employer representatives from industries concerned, graduates and guests, is expected, according to Vernon R. Titus, Management Division director and long-time coordinator of the program.

Diploma presentations will be made by John D. Hostutler, general manager of the Industrial Management Council of Rochester and a member of the RIT Board of Trustees. Dr. Paul A. Miller, RIT President, will preside over the convocation program.

Begun 45 years ago, with only one course offering and 10 students enrolled, the RIT Management Program has expanded today to include more than 1,600 students in nearly 100 course offerings. The program is one of the largest continuously operating ones in management education, and has during its 45-year history, graduated nearly 6,000 area supervisors.

A photography exhibit, prepared by students and staff of the College of Graphic Arts and Photography, will be on display through-out the day in the Union Lobby. Students whose work will be part of the exhibit include Photographers Jeri Buxton, Richard Daley, Stephen T. Smith and A. J. Zelada, and Designer Richard Stoecker. Faculty advisors are Tom Muir Wilson, staff chairman, photographic illustration, and C. James Gleason, assistant professor in the School of Photographic Arts and Sciences.

The exhibit will explore the use of communications technology among people in Telephone Company and Institute settings, as well as within the community as a whole.

Following the formal corporation meeting, at which directors and auditors for the year will be elected, a special multi-media audio-visual presentation will be shown.

The production was developed by students, faculty and staff from the Department of Communication Design and the Media Design Center at RIT. Producers include Bruce Weinstein, a graduate student in the Communication Design Department; R. Roger Remington, chairman of the Communication Design Department, and Frank Argento, coordinator of the Media Design Center.

The presentation, entitled "Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow," will employ slides, motion pictures, television and live performers to convey its message of Communications as a Process. Multi-screens will be used to create visual analogies, to create tensions, and to create reliefs.

According to Gene DePrez, RIT Director of Communications, the subject "Communication as a Process" "focuses creativity and awe unto itself. The subject, RIT, shares many paralleling qualities. The utilization of communication images in concert with RIT images will tend to create an alliance by association marrying these two subjects. Thus, the audience will experience a sense of bonding between Communication and RIT."

Mark Wollwage, a Communications Design student, and Alexander Lawson, Carey Professor in the School of Printing, are producing the printed "keepsake" program.

Dr. Paul A. Miller, RIT President, will introduce the multi-media production, suggesting the thrust of Communications at RIT in reference to the recent endowment by the telephone company of the Kern Professorship in Communications to foster communications research at RIT and to develop a diversified program in the communicating arts and sciences.

All students, faculty and staff are being invited to attend the annual meeting and multi-media production. Seats are limited, however. "We feel this meeting on the RIT campus will give students an opportunity to participate in a corporate meeting, to see business at work in their own environment," said George S. Beinetti, Rochester Telephone Corp. president.

Following the share owners meeting and communications presentation, campus visitors will remain on campus for luncheon. In the afternoon, they will tour various areas of the Institute involved in Communications activity.
