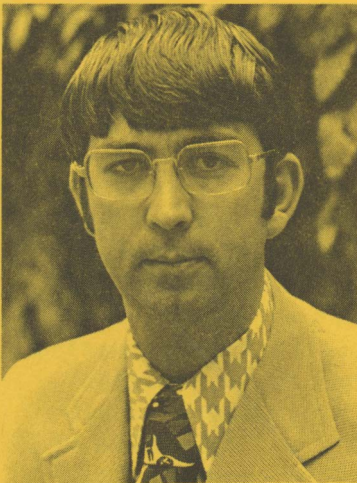


Associate VP — Student Affairs Named

Dr. Thomas R. Plough, former dean of students and assistant professor of sociology at Alma College, Alma, Mich., has been appointed associate vice president for Student Affairs at RIT.

Dr. Plough, who holds a B.A. in social sciences, an M.A. in student personnel administration, and a Ph.D. in higher education and administration from Michigan State University, will be responsible for a variety of areas in RIT's Student Affairs Division, according to Dr. Fred Smith, vice president for Student Affairs.

Dr. Plough will have administrative responsibilities in the areas of physical education and athletics, the Counseling Center, the College Alumni Union, the chaplains, recreation and student activities, and student health.

In addition, Dr. Smith said, he will work in such areas as student life programs that facilitate maximum student initiative and ingenuity; a comprehensive program of communication and human re-
