



Development Director Named



Mrs. Robert H. Wadsworth

Mrs. Robert H. Wadsworth has been named Director of Development for RIT. Her appointment will be effective Sept. 1.

Dorothy Wadsworth, who currently serves as a commissioner on the New York State Special Commission on Attica, will be responsible for the overall financial development programs of the Institute.

"We are extremely pleased that Mrs. Wadsworth has accepted this position with RIT and feel that her record of involvement within the Rochester community, and on a national level, will lend itself to our development area," said RIT President Dr. Paul A. Miller, in making the announcement of her appointment.

Mrs. Wadsworth has a long history of volunteer commitment in the Greater Rochester area. She is past president of both the Planned Parenthood League of Rochester and Monroe County, and the Neighborhood Health Center. She has also served as secretary of the Genesee Region Health Planning Council and was the chairman of the first Channel 21 Auction.

Currently, Mrs. Wadsworth is a member of the Board of Directors of the Community

RAC To Get Full Time Director

Rochester Area Colleges, Inc. (RAC), chartered last year by the Board of Regents to promote inter-institutional cooperation among the nine Rochester-area colleges, will appoint a full-time executive director, RAC President Paul A. Miller has announced.

Dr. Miller said Dr. Alexander R. Cameron, former acting director of the graduate program at the State University College at Brockport, will become the first full-time staff member RAC has had in its 10 year history.

RAC, founded in 1962, was incorporated in 1971 and chartered the same year by the New York State Board of Regents. The organization represents nine local public and private colleges with a combined enrollment of more than 48,000 students: the State University Colleges at Brockport and Geneseo; Colgate Rochester Divinity School-Bexley Hall; Monroe Community College; Nazareth College; Roberts Wesleyan College; Rochester Institute of Technology; St. John Fisher College; and the University of Rochester. Dr. Miller is president of RIT.

He said Cameron will have responsibility to "develop plans for the nine local colleges to share resources in order that the distinctive strengths in each of the institutions can be directed economically to the highest possible quality of educational opportunity.

"What we're really trying to do is come up with a voluntary, regional plan," he said, "and we hope Dr. Cameron will aid us in developing a guide for the coordination of higher education so that the distinctive missions of each of the nine of us can be fitted together."

Dr. Cameron, 49, has an A.B. in economics and an M.A. in history from Colgate University, and a Ph.D. in higher education from the University of Michigan.

He was professor of education and vice president for administration at Brockport between 1966-70; assistant to the chancellor of the State University of New York in 1965-66; and dean of students and lecturer at the University of Rochester in 1961-65.

Cameron, a native of Scotland, resides with his wife and three children at 86 Valley View Drive, Brockport.

"As the designated RIT liaison representative with Riverton, we have worked closely with Riverton on a number of projects of mutual interest, especially mass transportation for this part of Monroe County. In addition, we contemplate RIT joint ventures with Riverton in a number of educational project areas, many of which should provide for significant student participation.

"We hope any of you who are interested in the new community concept generally, and Riverton specifically, will join us for a first-hand report on June 29."

Titus To Head CCE Program Development

Vernon Titus, director of the division of management in the College of Continuing Education, has been named director of Program Development at RIT.

Dr. Robert Pease, dean of the College of Continuing Education, said Titus will continue as Director of the Management Diploma program.

In addition, he said, Titus' new assignment will be to "further broaden the base of cooperation between the Institute and the publics it serves, particularly in the field of continuing education."

Dr. Pease said Titus will attempt to bring upper management teams of the businesses and industries which support their employees in their studies to this campus for discussions with academic leaders. He said Titus will also look for new areas in which RIT can be of service to the continuing education student, and will assist in broadening the relationships between faculty and staff and local industrial and business personnel.

In addition, Pease said, Titus will establish counseling and guidance programs to help those who enter industry directly from high school and the community colleges become aware of the opportunities for further education in the College of Continuing Education.

Pease said Dr. Derrald Livingston has been named director of Business and Management and Miss Cecilia Farnsworth has been named assistant director. Livingston will have responsibility for the management degree program.

Child Care Center Director Appointed

Mrs. Gerda Dymcza has been appointed Director of the Horton Child Care Center, which will open in Riverknoll on September 18, and provide nursery facilities for three to five-year old children of women who attend RIT classes. The child care center will operate during the academic year (fall, winter and spring quarters) on a five-day a week basis.

The Horton Child Care Center is a memorial to Edward J. Horton, given by his wife, Metha H. Horton, as a living expression of his interest in children and their opportunities for education and a rewarding life.

"Because RIT is an institution of higher education, we want this to be more than just a child care center," says Mrs. Dymcza. "For that reason there will be educational value in the program for all children attending."

Children may attend one of two daily sessions, from 9 a.m. to noon or from 12:45 to 3:45 p.m.

Mrs. Dymcza is a graduate of Pembroke College of Brown University and recently completed her master's degree in Early Childhood Education at the State University of New York at Brockport. She taught nursery school in Ithaca, N.Y. and was on the faculty of Ithaca College from 1969-70. She is currently employed at the Rochester Community Child Care Center, but will work part time at RIT this summer to set up the program, and will join the full-time staff in September.

She and her husband, Richard, who is employed by the Monroe County Planning Council, have three children.
