

Ellingson To Get Founders Award

Dr. Mark Ellingson, who served as president of Rochester Institute of Technology from 1936 to 1969, will receive the coveted RIT Founders Award on Monday, Nov. 20.

Following a unique meeting of the Board of Trustees beginning at 5:30 p.m. in RIT's Ingle Auditorium, trustees, their wives, and special guests will pay tribute at a dinnerreception to the man who has served the Institute and helped guide its constant and spectacular growth since 1926 when he was appointed to the faculty as an instructor in economics. President Emeritus, Dr. Ellingson continues to serve the Institute in an advisory capacity from his office in the Metropolitan Center at 50 West Main St.

The dinner will be held in the large dining hall of the College-Alumni Union.

The Founders Award, to be presented for only the sixth time since its origin in 1934, will honor Dr. Ellingson for more than three decades of "directing the Institute through tremendous changes, challenges, growth and advancement in curriculum, financial viability and expanded enrollment...for a lifetime of achievement and service which demonstrates and vitalizes the ideals of the founders of the Institution."

Fox: The Student Is 'Consumer'

Jim Fox, director of Residence Halls and Food Service, says he insists the RIT student be treated as a "consumer." It may be that attitude by management that has helped to make living on campus more palatable for students.

Fox joined RIT last January as director of Food Service. He took the position that to improve the attitude of students to food service, you have to offer a quality meal at a reasonable price. Unlimited seconds also were offered and students loved it. He's now working to improve the speed of food service.

Last August Fox also was named to head the student housing program. Although he doesn't want to accept the credit, he can point to full dormitories for the first time since RIT moved to the Henrietta campus.

Unlike other years when students quickly moved out of the dorms, the 2600 population is remaining fairly stable.

"The entire staff is oriented to the customer and service is the key word," Fox explained.

Bob Sargeant is responsible for management systems. A computer terminal for housing and food service is helping develop a more efficient operation. A file search for information that used to take two weeks, now can be done by the computer in 10 minutes.

"There are bugs to be worked out, but once the machinery is functional, our data will be current and accurate—this will help student attitude toward the overall program," Fox stated.

Rich Lawton is responsible for programming and staff training and development. Lawton said the entrie staff is responding more to getting the job done.

Sandy Miller handles telephone, light, heat and maintenance problems. His job is to act quickly to solve problems and spot many before they are ever reported.

In food service, Jim Bingham directs all operations on the academic side, while Jerry Shreve is operations manager in housing.

Sue Cavaleri is administrative assistant to Fox and is responsible for the financial aspects of the program.

Head residents are now known as staff

assistants and they too are customer oriented.

"The change is overall staff attitude is partly responsible for the improved student satisfaction," Fox said. "But painting in the dorm has helped and so has landscaping. The trees help offset the brick and provide greater warmth. Some of the dorms will have new carpeting and furniture this year."

Parking continues to be a problem. Students are concerned about both cars and bikes being stolen. Improving security is an immediate concern. New bike racks have

Photo Seminar Set In March

The Photographic Process as a Scientific Instrument, an intensive five-day program designed to assist engineers, scientists, and technicians in applying photographic technology to the acquisition of data, will be held at RIT from March 19 to 23, 1973.

Sponsored by RIT's College of Graphic Arts and Photography, the program is for those with a B.S. degree or equivalent experience in physics, chemistry, or engineering. Class sessions will be held from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., with two evening seminar sessions as an additional option.

Cartoon Characters On Alumni Assignment

Will Ferris marry Alice? Will RIT alumni raise the money to produce a film about their alma mater?

Those questions are on the lips of the more than 20,000 Institute alumni as a result of a mailing informing them of the alumni film project, and asking their contributions to it.

Designed as a cartoon strip, the mailer stars Ferris Reel, Tallulah Tingle (who later reveals herself to be Alice Alumni), and Milton Moneymouth.

Ferris and Milton, rival film producers are competing to win Alice and to produce a film about RIT.

Setting her two suitors against each other, Alice, a secret agent of the RIT Alumni Association, tells them she'll marry the first one to produce a film about RIT. Deep in her heart, Alice hopes Ferris, a good guy, will win.

The above may be fantasy, but the alumni film project is very real.

Conceived in a goals and objectives task force of the Alumni Association, the film is an alumni project from start to finish.

It will be a series of 16 millimeter film modules. One basic module will tell the general story of RIT. The others will spotlight the individual colleges, departments and activities.

It is believed that the project will

serve the vital need of the Institute for a visual presentation for a variety of audiences. In combination or in total, the film format could play a major role in the Institute's drive to increase admissions. High school, two-year college, alumni, civic and professional groups and professional conventions are among the projected audiences.

Later, the film can be updated easily, one or two modules at a time, as changing conditions make it necessary.

The Executive Council of the Alumni Association accepted the film as a worth-while alumni project.

Gerald J. Antos, photography '59, is the project director. Fred R. Guevara, photography '60, is chairman of the film task force. A. John Bartholomew, business administration '60 is fund-raising chairman, and Harris H. Rusitzky, food administration '56. is heading the special gifts section. Thomas G. Raco, art and design '63, educational specialist at NTID, is serving as faculty liaison.

Guevara's task force is maintaining close contact with Antos in determining the content of the film.

A number of other alumni are involved, and alumni are encouraged to volunteer their professional talents.

been installed as a student service.

Long range, Fox would like to see the dorms become more like apartment complexes. He admits it would take structural changes.

"With the greater number of transfer students coming to RIT, I'd like to see the requirement of living on campus loosened," Fox remarked. "If we offer quality housing and good food, we won't have to worry about getting students to live on campus. Giving the student the best product for the best price is attainable."

Founders Award cont'd....

Capping Dr. Ellingson's remarkable career of guiding RIT through more than three decades of growth was the construction of the new \$65 million campus in Henrietta, completed in the fall of 1968, a year prior to his retirement as president.

During his tenure in office, the College's full-time enrollment rose from 550 students to nearly 5,000 and its evening college enrollment from 1,700 to more than 11,000. Endowment increased from \$1,500,000 to over \$220 million (book value), and total assets from \$2,400,000 in 1936 to over \$111 million as of June 30, 1968. Since 1936 the Institute's annual operating budget grew from \$258,000 to a budget in excess of \$20,000,000 in 1968-69.

Under his guidance, academic programs in science, engineering, printing, photography, fine arts, and business administration

increased in both size and scope. In 1966 Rochester Institute of Technology was selected by the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare as the site for the National Technical Institute for the Deaf.

Completing the list of invited guests will be presidents of the day and evening college Student Associations, the Alumni Association, Faculty Council, Women's Club, Women's Council, and the College Union Board.
