RIT Building To Become Boys' Club

Ownership of Rochester Institute of Technology's Ritter-Clark Memorial Building at 155 Spring Street in downtown Rochester was officially transferred to the Emmet Blakeney Gleason Memorial Fund Inc. for a new Boys' Club of Rochester facility on Wednesday, Oct. 18.

Directors of the new Boys' Club approved last spring a commitment to raise \$500,000 for an endowment fund to clear the way for the turnover of the building to them for a clubhouse.

The Emmet Blakeney Gleason Memorial Fund is purchasing the building, which houses an ice rink, gymnasium, and other recreational facilities, for \$700,000. Adjacent property at 8 Livingston Park also was involved in the purchase.

A stipulation of the agreement was that the building would be given by the Gleason Fund to the Boys' Club if the club was successful in raising \$500,000 in a community endowment fund drive by Oct. 1.

The Gleason Fund then was to donate \$100,000 to the club to refurbish the building and convert its facilities to club use, and also give \$250,000 to the endowment fund.

Also as part of the sales agreement, RIT agreed to provide a parking lot for the new Boys' Club facilities, since the previous parking lot was taken by the state for new highway and expressway construction.

Rochester had been the largest city in the nation without a Boys' Club. The club was formed here in the summer of 1971.


Lloyd L. Hurst, lawyer and member of the New York State Human Rights Appeals Board, is president.

Paul Miller, chairman and chief executive of Gannett Co., and an RIT trustee, is a national board member of Boys' Clubs of America and was active in establishing the club here.

Hurst expects the Rochester club will serve several hundred boys as soon as it takes over the Ritter-Clark building, and eventually up to 2,000.

The Ritter-Clark Building was built in the mid-1950's and was named in honor of the late Frank Ritter and the late George H. Clark. Both men contributed substantially to RIT's development.

Much of the building's cost was borne by F. Ritter Shumway, honorary chairman of (Continued on Page 3)

Mailer To Speak Here

RIT's College Union Board is bringing writer Norman Mailer to campus Thursday, Oct. 26, for a lecture-discussion at 8 p.m. in Clark Gymnasium.

Mailer will speak about his writing and his filmmaking, show some film clips, and talk with the audience.

Part of the discussion will focus on his third and latest film, "Maidenstone," which will be shown the three days before Mailer's visit, Oct. 23, 24, and 25, at 7:30 and 10 p.m. in Booth Auditorium.

"Maidenstone" is being released for public viewing after a year at film festivals, museums and private screenings. Subtitled a "mystery," it is a collage of Mailer's subconscious in which the author is Norman T. Kingsley, a movie director and candidate for U.S. president.

The film was shot during the summer of 1968, when Mailer called family, friends, associates, and some professional actors together to an estate in eastern Long Island. There was no script.

Engineering Film Series Continues

"The Lead Matrix," a 27-minute film on the industrial uses of lead, will be shown at 1 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 24, in Room 1030 of the College of Engineering.

Furnished by the U.S. Department of the Interior, the film is the second in a fall series of professional films for engineers and students in related fields. The film series is sponsored by the College of Engineering.

"Transistor Structure and Technology," a 38-minute commentary on how and why transistors work, will be shown on Tuesday, Oct. 31.

Other planned films in the series are Strasenburgh Planetarium special—The Radio Sky, and several selections, furnished by the Department of the Interior: The Story of the Hoover Dam, The Barrier Between—Colorado's Irrigation Project, and The First Fifteen Years——Water Clean—Up Activities in the Ohio Valley.

Sybron Corp. and a grandson of Frank Ritter, and other members of the Ritter family. Shumway, active in an effort to preserve the building for skating and other recreational use, is a director of the Boys' Club of Rochester and a member of the RIT Board of Trustees.

The late Mrs. Miriam B. Gleason established the Emmet Blakeney Gleason Memorial Fund in 1959 in memory of her son, who served as the third president of Gleason Works from 1947 until his death in 1958.

A Gleason Fund spokesman said, "Among others, Paul Miller of the Gannett Co. and Howard F. Carver, president of Gleason Works, had the foresight to see that the Rochester area would be well served by a Boys' Club. The gifts committee of the fund felt this particular project, which offers the prospect of helping to mold young men into more useful adults, offered a very worthwhile endeavor which the fund should support."

James R. Buchholz, vice president of business and finance at RIT, stated, "RIT is heartened that through the imagination and commitment of the Gleason Fund, the Boys' Club and its various patrons, that this important recreational facility will see new dimensions of service to the youth of Rochester."
