





Scholarship Fund to Benefit from SW Profits

Profits from this year's Spring Weekend will go into RIT's scholarship fund as the result of action taken by Student Council early this year.

To be awarded by the administration scholarship committee, the number and size of the scholarships will be decided when the net profit of Spring Weekend is determined

Formerly, all profits from the weekend were returned to the Student Council treasury. The action taken by Council this year is binding on all future councils unless they pass legislation to revoke it.

Of this plan, Mr. Robert F. Belknap, Council advisor, stated, "This procedure instituted by Student Council represents a very worthwhile step in providing financial aid to people who could not otherwise complete their education."







A sparkling array of musical entertainment, featuring Kai Winding's Sextet, is scheduled for the Spring Weekend Jazz Concert. The affair will take place Sunday, May 5, from 2 to 5 in the afternoon, in the Ritter-Clark gym.

The sextet is very unique in that it includes four trombones. Winding is one of the few modern musicians to find success with this unusual instrumentation.

A Dane who came to the United States in 1934, Kai Winding began his jazz career with the Benny Goodman band in 1945. Since that time, he has played with Stan Kenton and Charlie Ventura. He led his first combo jointly with Buddy Stewart in

More recently, Kai teamed up with another top trombonist, Jay Jay Johnson. The two made several records and experimented for the first time with the four-trombone' style. Those interested

in Winding music will enjoy "The Trombone Style," a recent disk by the sextet.





3 Trophy Awards To be Presented


Trophies made in the School of American Craftsmen will be a part of this year's Spring Weekend festivities.
