

Leica Geosystems, a world wide leader in geospacial imaging, has recently chosen the Chester F. Carlson Center for Imaging Science at RIT to serve as a Center of Excellence in Photogrammetry and Remote Sensing. The award includes a donation of software and technical support.

ì We are looking forward to this partnership with RIT,î says Bob Morris, president of Leica. ì The Center of Excellence at RIT will serve as a testing ground for our new products and leverage the expertise of the research staff, students and faculty through the broad range of imaging and remote sensing projects in which they are involvedî

The Center of Excellence will be integrated into the Laboratory for Imaging Algorithms and Systems, a research group within the Center for Imaging Science. The lab is currently partnering with the Monroe County Office of Emergency Preparedness and the National Geospatial-Intelligence Agency to provide more accurate mapping and location technologies to be used during possible terrorist attacks or national emergencies.

In addition, the lab will be utilizing the center as part of its Wildfire Airborne Sensor research program with NASA and the U.S. Forest Service. This effort uses high performance sensor technology and software to track and map forest fires to assist the forest service and firefighters in identifying fires earlier and helping to ensure the safety of crews on the ground. The wildfire team recently mapped a series of forest fires for the U.S. Forest Service in western Montana.

ìRIT is very proud to be chosen as a Leica Center of Excellence, says Stefi Baum, director of the Center for Imaging Science. i We plan to use this software donation to enhance our efforts in remote sensing both as an academic and research toolî

The Laboratory for Imaging Algorithms and Systems is focused on the development of prototype sensors and software for observation of the earth using aerial and satellitebased imaging systems. The main areas of the labís research are the development of image exploitation tools, airborne and ground based sensor systems, and decision support tools for incident managers.

The wildfire research program was initiated with federal support



Manning releases new debt study

Many of u s ó college students, young singles, young families, mature families, empty nesters and seniors ó a re living with debt.

So says RIT's consumer finance expert, Robert Manning, who has created an important new research report called iLiving With Debt: A Life Stage Analysis of Changing Attitudes and Behaviors The report, which was commissioned by Lending Tree, was released on Oct. 26.

Manning, an economist and professor of finance in RIT's College of Business, is the author of Credit Card Nation. He is a specialist in consumer finance, socio-economic trends and retail banking deregulation, and he has testified before Congress on the use of credit.

His new 150-page study underscores several universal themes that appear consistently across life stages:

Living with increasingly higher levels of debt has become an accepted and normal state of affairs. The social stigma of high levels of debt is largely gone.

" Many people attribute their willingness to go into debt ó or to take on additional levels of debt ó directly to a dramatic increase in spending on children and grandchildren.

Consequently, as families save less for college and rely more heavily on student loans, this contributes to higher debt levels among their children, who enter young adulthood with more debt (both student and consumer) than previous generations.


Attitudes toward home ownership have changed, from simply providing necessary shelter to satisfying both a need and a tangible, secure (and considered near perfect) investment. Home equity is often considered a financial stabilizer or iway out of troubleî

^a Many participants feel illequipped to make prudent financial decisions, and long-term financial planning, with the exception of buying a house, is largely absent. Few have developed, let alone adhere to, a personal budget, although older groups were more likely than younger groups to do so.

For the study, Manning utilized

two focus groups comprised of randomly-selected members of each of the six specified life stage groups. He conducted his research on consecutive days over the summer of 2005 in three distinctly different geographic regions: Rochester; Washington, D.C.; and Orlando, Fla.

Theatre. Two of the films, Drawn In and While Supplies Last, were among the entries in the 2005 regional finals for Student Academy Awards.





secured by Congressman James Walsh. The federal funds have enabled the RIT lab to significantly enhance its development of sensor technology and its applications in a wide range of uses. The research has also spawned collaboration with a local company, Geospatial Systems Inc., which is commercializing a new imaging product based on the technology.

The Center of Excellence program developed by Leica Geosystems was

conceived to foster collaboration with a small group of outstanding academic institutions, bound together by a commitment to advance concepts, technology and expertise, which leverage imagebased spatial data. The workflows and case studies developed using the Leica Geosystems products in class settings, demonstrations and projects will provide new research and development in the field and prepare the nation's next generation of imaging
