"Save Darfur" Project

"How would you feel if you found out that a radical militia group had a mission to eliminate all deaf people?" Students at the National Technical Institute for the Deaf (NTID) enrolled in Intercultural Communication considered this question.

This idea is not so far-fetched in Darfur, a region in Sudan, Africa. Men, women, and children are being beaten, raped, and killed by radical a militia group due to the color of their skin and/or their tribal affiliation. These people have been pushed out of their homes and forced to seek refuge in concentration camps far away. Surprisingly, not many people are aware of this crisis, which President Bush has labeled as "genocide."

As part of National Youth Service Day and Global Youth Service Day this spring, NTID students Jason Cole, Nicholas Curtain, Holly Dzimidas, and Jazzy Jones teamed up to coordinate a wristband sale that raised \$120. The monies will be used for food, water, and medical supplies to the people of Sudan.

Tsunami Card Project

Students in the Organizational Communication and the Deaf Employee class organized a fundraising project to help some deaf students from Thailand who had visited NTID as part of a PEN-International grant. NTID students set up a "mock company" to raise money for their deaf friends. Scott Wright, Sherrelle Gulley, Steven Rosner, Ray Sengbush, and Janell Wagstaff designed notecards. Wright and Gulley designed individual cards, and the class produced a card with input from all five class members. ASL Stamp, Inc. gave the students written permission to use one of their images on the card.

The students sold their notecards at a community event as well as to participants at an NTID-sponsored panel discussion, and within four weeks raised \$150, which will be used to provide relief to deaf tsunami victims and their families.

Students in another section of Organizational Communication and the Deaf Employee focused on the Rochester community for their National Youth Service Day project. Talking to individual students, floor by floor in the dorms on campus, they collected more than 10 huge boxes of clothing for donation.
