## Expressions of Diversity Conference Opens April 28

### Annual Week of Events Lead into First Innovation Festival, May 3



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Diversity Drives Innovation is the theme for this year's week-long Expressions of Diversity Conference. The annual event, sponsored by the President's Commission on Pluralism and Inclusion, will be filled with five days of distinguished presenters, workshops, reunions and awards. The conference leads into the first IMAGINE RIT: Innovation + Creativity Festival at RIT on May 3, and should prove to be a spring-board into how diversity and ideas inspire innovation.

This year's conference opens with the fourth annual Diversity Day sponsored by the RIT Board of Trustees. Featuring author, Frans Johansson, the Diversity Day session is open to all members of RIT. This year, the event will take place at the Gordon Field House to ensure more can participate and interact with quests.

Johansson will discuss how the most innovative companies build upon diverse talent pools to form teams as a defined strategy to be more cutting-edge. These companies have become brand leaders, strong research and development centers - and very profitable. In his address Johansson shows what happens when different cultures collide and ignite an explosion of extraordinary new ideas and discoveries. Participants at Diversity Day will learn: why diversity drives innovation; how critical diversity is for organizations that want to innovate; and that most organizations have a long way to go in leveraging diversity.

The Expressions of Diversity Conference continues on Tuesday with international poet, and NTID alumni, James Cohn. As founder of the National Deaf Poetry Conference, Cohn will present ASL and the Post Beat Poetry Era in the afternoon.

A centerpiece of the Expressions of Diversity Week Conference is the awarding of the Isaac L. Jordan Scholarships and Faculty/Staff Pluralism Award. The scholarships are given to outstanding students based on academic merit and participation in campus and community organizations to further the concepts of diversity and pluralism. The Faculty/Staff Award is given to a member of the RIT community who best exemplifies the spirit of Isaac Jordan, the award namesake and first chairperson of the Commission for Promoting Pluralism. The awards will be presented on Wednesday afternoon in the Fireside Lounge.

Later that same day, Minett Professor, G. Peter Jemison and the College of Liberal Arts Professor Jason Younker will discuss 'Stereotypes of Native Americans in Movies', held in the Fireside Lounge.

When the Right Brain/Left Brain workshop was first presented in 2006 it quickly became a favorite session in the Campus Week of Dialogue. The presentation, by Professors Michael Peres and David Cok, is reprised on Thursday in the Fireside Lounge. The speakers will focus on the seemingly divergent goals of the traditional right brain/

left brain thinking-- art vs. science or creativity vs. technology, where both work together toward a desired end.

# Author Frans Johansson to Speak at Diversity Day: An Excerpt from *The Medici Effect*

The following is a short excerpt from Frans Johansson's book, The Medici Effect. In it he describes the interconnection of diversity and innovation, how people and ideas from a wide variety of fields, endeavors and backgrounds come together at the Intersection – that place where unique ideas, bring about valuable and creative solutions and new directions.

"For most of us, the best chance to innovate lies at the Intersection. Not only do we have a greater chance of finding remarkable idea combination there, we will also find many more of them. To be specific, stepping into the Intersection does not mean simply combining two different concepts into a new idea. These types of combinations are part of both directional and intersectional innovations. Instead, the Intersection represents a place that drastically increases the chances for unusual combinations to occur.

Imagine that you are a health

care worker caring for paralyzed patients. If you wish to develop new treatment strategies from within your field, you have to understand that field thoroughly. It is critical that you master most concepts within your field to find new ideas that work. In addition, since it is easy to predict where the field is heading, you will have a lot of competition at every turn.

Now imagine that you reach out and connect your experience with that of neuroscience. Suddenly there will be many new options and ideas for you to explore. Neurological concepts you had no idea event existed can potentially be combined with existing treatment strategies to generate breakthrough intersectional ideas. By stepping into the Intersection you will, in other words, have unleashed an explosion of fresh, intriguing idea combinations.

This explosion of remarkable ideas is what happened in Florence during the Renaissance,

and it suggests something very important. If we can just reach an intersection of disciplines or cultures, we will have a greater chance of innovating, simply because there are so many unusual ideas to go around. And as the following chapter will show, there has never been a better time to do it than now." [Johansson, The Medici Effect, 2006]

#### About Frans Johansson

Frans Johansson is an entrepreneur and thought-leader. He is also a consultant and the managing director for a hedge fund. This young businessman previously co-founded and managed two companies, a Boston-based software company and medical device company operating out of Baltimore, Maryland and Stockholm Sweden. Raised in Sweden by his African American and Cherokee mother and Swedish father, Frans earned an MBA at Harvard School of ScB in environmental science at Brown University.

## Drawn to Diversity Performers Coming to RIT


Comic book heroes come alive in the Drawn to Diversity program, scheduled for Tuesday, April 29, 7 – 9 pm in the Fireside Lounge. The interactive program featuring a cast of 'superheroes' is one of the creative ways students at Alfred University sought to promote ideas of diversity. The group, consisting of undergraduate students who take on the personas of familiar comic book characters, use story telling, discussion and art forms to address equality, stereotypes, ignorance and interpersonal communication.

Drawn to Diversity's mission is to "teach history, inspire artists,

cultivate dialogue, and fight ignorance using popular art and media forms." The group first began developing the idea for Drawn to Diversity with sponsorship by Marvel Comics and MTV. The art project-turned-diversity-forum grew from a study in stereotypes to educational workshops presented to local elementary schools, high schools and now, college audiences.

Last year, the group began to look at the various advertising icons, familiar faces such as Aunt Jemima and Uncle Ben for example, and the images portrayed by these icons. In 2007, they formed a partnership with Wegmans to
