Michael A. Hoyt, a senior at Washington School for the Deaf in Vancouver, Wash., took first place for his 3-D animation project, "The Worm Street."

Michelle Chung, a sophomore at E. C. Drury School for the Deaf in Mississauga, Ontario, Canada, won the free-hand art in digital form category for her project, "The Meaning of Life."

Warrance Yu, of Markham, Ontario, Canada, a junior at E.C. Drury School for the Deaf, won the graphic media category with his "Destruction" project.

Participants, accompanied by parents and teachers, attended the Deaf Film Festival, campus tours, and various social receptions.
