NTID Performing Arts presents Shakespeare's classic "Macbeth"

NTID Performing Arts is pleased to present Macbeth at the Robert F. Panara Theatre (LBJ building, RIT campus) Thursday - Saturday, November 1 - 3 at 7:30 pm, and Sunday, November 4 at 2:00 pm. This production features Deaf actors using Sign Language, and hearing actors using spoken English, to tell this classic story of lust, power, and tyranny. NTID Performing Arts is one of only a few theatres worldwide that produce this form of theatre - you don't have to know any Sign Language to enjoy the show.

The game of power is the most terrifying game of all. When a good and heroic leader, Macbeth, is confronted by a triple enemy in war, he is victorious. But in his triumph, he is unable to see the triple enemy fighting for his heart and mind--the mysterious Weird Sisters, his wife, and his own desire for power and success. When friends and allies become aware of the evil breaking into his soul and fight to stop him, Macbeth unleashes a desperate game of terrorism, massacre, and tyranny. This stunning production will leave you amazed at the genius of Shakespeare, shaken by the lesson of power in the absence of love, and thrilled by the timelessness of its story.

As play director Bonnie Meath-Lang says, "The Performing Arts program chose Shakespeare's masterpiece, Macbeth (or "The Scottish Play", if you are talking about it in the theatre!) for many reasons. First and foremost, Shakespeare knew a good story when he read or heard one, and reworked it with his uncanny understanding of human nature. Power does corrupt, not only institutions, but the core of human relationships. The world of Macbeth descends into paranoia and betrayal all around, but the great tragedy lies closer to home, in the destruction of passionate and humane relationships through the abuse of power."
